Marie Heim-Vögtlin grants: Results of the 2014 call

The 24th call of the Marie Heim-Vögtlin (MHV) scheme attracted 152 applications by women researchers, a slight decrease compared to the previous record year (- 13%).

After an initial selection, 51 candidates were invited to present their project to one of the three MHV evaluation committees of the National Research Council.

In December 2014, the Swiss National Science Foundation awarded 36 new MHV grants: 14 in the humanities and social sciences, 7 in mathematics, natural and engineering sciences and 15 in biology and medicine. 14% of the new MHV grantees are doctoral students, who all work in the humanities and social sciences. The new recipients will begin or continue their research activities in 11 Swiss institutions of higher education and research institutes.

The Research Council placed particular emphasis on the candidates' reasons to apply for a MHV grant. Indeed, these grants are meant for women with excellent scientific qualifications who had to reduce or interrupt their research activities due to family commitments. Furthermore, the MHV scheme primarily offers support to scientists who would find it difficult to obtain other funding due to their nonlinear background.

97% of the new recipients had experienced delays in their scientific career after having children and, for a third of them, also due to the professional career of their partner. This year a single grant was awarded to a woman researcher whose main reason for her career delay was the career of her partner.

The Research Council also considered the long-term perspectives offered by an MHV grant. A key criterion was therefore the commitment of the host institutions to employ the grantees beyond the end of the grant. This commitment contributes to achieving the key objective of the scheme: the integration of women researchers in academia and their long-term pursuit of an independent scientific career.

The next call is scheduled for May 2015. Interested women researchers can submit their applications until 2 August.
